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K-4 Home Reading Program

Dear parents/carers

To help instil a passion for reading, students in kindergarten through to Year 4 will participate in a home reading program again this year. This program encourages children to read daily to their parents/carers, to not only practise the skills they have learnt in class, but to also help them to be more confident, accurate readers.

Each child has been issued with their own reading diary where they can record their achievements by filling out a daily account. Your child can also draw in the blank faces to express how they felt about their reading. There is also a space for parents/caregivers to comment.

There are achievement awards and stickers to help motivate your child to develop good reading habits plus reading tips on correcting mistakes and encouraging the reader to tackle a wide range of material.

Home readers can be returned depending on needs. It is also important that students read known texts more than once to help them become fluent readers who read how they speak.

On completion of each weekly reading achievement, students need to show their teacher so that their name can be put into the 'Home Reading Draw'. Each Monday morning starting in Week 4 a name will be drawn, and the lucky recipient will select a book to take home and keep.
