This week, you will be working on preparing for your assessment.

Your assessment is a <u>descriptive essay</u>, responding to the question:

How does the text '<u>Luke Lloyd Alienoid'</u> by John Armstrong capture the themes of friendship and belonging?


But what is an essay, anyway?

An essay is a written text. It is usually about the personal point of view of the author. An essay can have all sorts of purposes.

For example, it can be very argumentative. It can talk about points for and against the essay question. Essays usually give new points about topics.

This booklet will break it right down to help you get it done.

The booklet will be structured with a traffic light system:



Red light – have a go if you're looking for a challenge!

Yellow light - most people from stage 4 have a

Green light – everyone from stage 4 have a go.

4. Who are Luke's friends?

5. How do Luke's friends help him?

6. Where does Luke belong?

7. How do you know he belongs there?

Now, we are going to look at themes.

What are themes?


A theme is a big idea within a story.


This assignment wants you to look at two: friendship, and belonging.

What does it mean to belong?

On the next page are both of these key themes. In a mind map, write down a few parts of the play that shows friendship, and a few that show belonging. The first one has been done for you.





Assessment Part 1: Essay structure (introductions)

An essay normally has an introduction, a few body paragraphs, and a conclusion.

We will start with your introduction.

An introduction should:

- State the name of the text.
- Give a very short description of the text.
- Explain what you are going to say about the question.

For example:

The text we read in class was a play called *Luke Lloyd Alienoid* by John Armstrong. It is about a little boy called Luke who struggles with bullying and not knowing his dad, but eventually he makes great friends. This essay will explain how friendship can help us get through hard situations, and how we will always find somewhere we belong.


Assessment Part 1: Essay structure (paragraphs)

The next step after your introduction is a paragraph.

Each paragraph should go into more detail about one of the themes, **friendship** or **belonging.** You should aim for at least **4 sentences** in each paragraph.

This one will go through friendship.

At MCS, we structure our paragraphs using PEEL. This shows us what to write in each sentence. A diagram below explains what each letter means, and gives you some examples to start off.



An example of a PEEL paragraph about friendship in Luke Lloyd Alienoid is included below. It is colour-coded using PEEL, and uses sentence starters in the graphic above.

To begin with, the play Luke Lloyd Alienoid explains how important friends can be when we are going through hard times. For example, when Luke is being bullied, his friends Mish and Astro come to the rescue to help him. A quote that shows this is when Mish says to Luke: "Luke, are you alright," and Luke replies "I think so. Thanks. For the Sabre Wolf stuff, I mean." This tells us that Luke appreciates Mish's friendship, and he is thankful for how she rescued him from Connor, Jake and Jared. In conclusion, the play Luke Lloyd Alienoid shows us that friends can help us in tough situations.

On the next page is table to help you with your first paragraph. Look back to the PEEL graphic to find ways to start each sentence.
